

- Tokyo University 1877 1882
- Became Teikoku Daigaku (Imperial University) in 1886
- Politics, philosophy and economics
- History of Western Philosophy taught by Ernest Fenollosa







Ernest Fenollosa (1853 – 1908)

- American graduated Harvard University
- Founder, the Herbert Spencer Club

- Later became Professor of English Literature at Tokyo Higher Normal School - Principal was Kanō Jigorō

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

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








Matthew Arnold (1822-1888)

- Son of Thomas Arnold, Headmaster of Rugby School
- Culture and Anarchy, (1869)
- The belief that the pursuit of culture and excellence required self-discipline and self-control, developed through practice.








Matthew Arnold (1822-1888)

"Culture is the endeavour to know the best and to make this knowledge prevail for the good of all humankind."


"Think not only of yourself, but strive to benefit others."





John Stuart Mill (1806-1873)

- Ambitious, philosopher father, taught classics aged 3.
- Utilitarianism (1863)
- Philosophy of utilitarianism is that actions should be judged on their ability to promote the greatest happiness for the greatest number of people.
- He also placed emphasis on respect for others and the proper use of power.





"The only purpose for which power can be rightfully exercised over any member of a civilised community against his will, is to prevent harm to others."


"Best use of energy; to apply oneself to use one's energy in the highest and best manner with virtue as the objective."






Samuel Smiles (1812-1904)


- Humble beginnings, campaigned for workers' rights
- Self-Help; with Illustrations of Character and Conduct (1859)
- The belief that "character" (a combination of moral and intellectual qualities, including honesty, integrity, and self-control) was essential for success in life.

"The battle of life is, in most cases, fought uphill; and to win it without a struggle were perhaps to win it without honour. If there were no difficulties there would be no success"


"We always use means that are just, value courtesy, and stand up to your opponent in a manly, upstanding manner."






Herbert Spencer (1820-1903)

- Son of a teacher, very influential writer.
- Education: Intellectual, Moral and Physical (1861)
- Advocated that education encompassing intellectual, moral, and physical development was essential for personal and social progress.








Herbert Spencer (1820-1903)

"Tell dojo students you must forge your body..... Moving in complete control."






Ernest Fenollosa – Graduation speech 1882

 - the most effective use of mind and body may be described as the maximum efficient utilisation of energy.
- Jita Kyōei
 - each member of society must function in harmony and cooperation with the others.
 - nothing is more important than living prosperously together.
